

The new Your Scottish Archives portal was launched on Tuesday 10th December 2024, at the SCA Annual Conference in Stirling.

Your Scottish Archives is a unique project to gather and make available worldwide, through a dynamic online portal, catalogue descriptions from archives across Scotland, including local authority, health, business and community archives, and records of under-represented groups. This major new resource is managed by the Scottish Council on Archives (SCA) partnering with Jisc/Archives Hub. It will build capacity amongst archive holders and develop skills, particularly amongst local communities, making an enormous contribution to the wider heritage sector by improving access to Scotland's documented past.



# 'Blackmail, Burnings, Banishment and Shipwreck: Aberdeen Crimes and Convicts 1830s-1840s'

by Dr Dee Hoole

Dee Hoole is a social historian who began with her own family history in Yorkshire. She is now an Honorary Research Fellow in the Department of History at the University of Aberdeen. Her research interests are the poor of Aberdeen – specifically those dissected in the Medical Schools of Aberdeen c.1832-1914 and used as subjects in the teaching of Anatomy. Currently other Aberdeen research includes Juvenile Delinquency, Prostitution and Transportation of Female Convicts to Tasmania.

Using High Court records Dee researched three crimes, followed the lives of the criminals and shone a light on the social history of Aberdeen.

# 'Homes fit for Heroes: 1919 Act houses in the 1921 census'

Kay Williams has a doctoral degree in urban historical geography. She has recently returned to historical research in retirement following many years working in learning development in higher education.

Was your ancestor living in a brand-new council house in the 1921 census? In November 1918 Prime Minister Lloyd George promised to make Britain a fit country for heroes to live in. The 1919 Act which followed required local authorities to assess local housing need and enabled them to provide homes subsidised by central government. Many of the council schemes built were low-density developments influenced by Garden City ideas.

This talk looked at examples of 1919 Act homes that some of you might discover your ancestors had lived in at the time of the 1921 census.

Looking for Irish ancestors may be one of your key priorities, but understanding what Ireland actually is may be quite another! Who are the various peoples referred to today as "the Irish"? What were the changing administrative boundaries that we need to be aware of when carrying out research in Irish documents from across time? Where are the main gatekeeping institutions in Ireland and beyond which preserve the Irish ancestral story? In this talk, family historian Chris Paton provided a much-needed background primer to help provide context to your Irish research!

Northern Irish born Chris Paton lives in Ayrshire, in the west of Scotland, where he works as a professional genealogist, an author, tutor and and a lecturer specialising in Scottish and Irish research. A former television documentary maker for the BBC and STV, and case worker for a Member of the Scottish Parliament, Chris holds a Postgraduate Diploma in Genealogical Studies from the University of Strathclyde, and is a member of the Association of Professional Genealogists.

# 'Tracing your Scottish Family History: Solving one puzzle at a time'

Researching your family history is never straightforward. People had complicated lives and the way their details have been recorded can leave us in a complete muddle.

How can you foresee and avoid 'brickwalls'? When the standard records don't answer all your questions, where can you look?

Scottish genealogist Emma Maxwell shared a case study. Emma traced the family history of a Scotsman who became an American citizen in 1922 back to 1792 by solving one puzzle at a time.

- Don't make assumptions Two people listed as a 'child' of the family head don't necessarily have the same mother.
- Don't look at things through a 21st century lens An illegitimate child could be recorded using a variety of names; it may be more of a reflection on the person recording the information than what the child was known by.
- Know the features of a variety of websites There is no 'best website'; they may all be useful at different times
- Make use of free websites and indexed records Even if it's not the most likely place to find information, use these before going through unindexed records.
- Use wildcards as standard to avoid 'missing' people
- Find all the puzzle pieces Look at as many records as you can afford. Marriage records may give different information to a death record. Siblings' certificates can be illuminating.
- Review what you think you 'know'
- Keep learning Use the basic records first but get to know what other records exist, what they tell us and how to access them.


